Wildfire smoke information

Poor air quality can be harmful to health, especially for those with chronic conditions like asthma, chronic obstructive pulmonary disease (COPD), heart disease, diabetes, and for pregnant people, infants and children, and older adults.

Take steps to keep you and your loved ones safe and healthy:

- Reduce the amount of time spent outdoors
- Stay hydrated
- Avoid rigorous outdoor activities, like exercise
- Keep windows closed in vehicles and homes

• If you have one, use an indoor air cleaner or filtration system, or recirculate indoor air in a forced air system that is filtered (turn on your furnace fan)

Staying informed during an emergency

When emergencies happen, people need up-to-date information. The newly designed <u>EmergencyInfoBC</u> website shares this information in one place so it's easy to access on a computer or phone.

New features include the latest evacuation alerts and orders at the top, an interactive map, and links to other resources that will help you prepare for an emergency. You can also share information directly from the website to Facebook or X. By sharing from the website, you can be sure it's verified and up-to-date.

Organization and community news

National Day for Truth and Reconciliation (NDTR) is September 30

NDTR honours history and healing together and aims to acknowledge the painful truths of historical injustices and mistreatment of Indigenous peoples of Canada. This day also provides an opportunity for reflection, dialogue, and understanding between Indigenous and non-Indigenous communities in the pursuit of healing and reconciliation.

New long-term care home coming to Quesnel

Seniors in Quesnel will have greater access to care closer to home with the approval of a new long-term care home, which will bring more than 220 new publicly funded beds to the community.

The new home will add 221 new beds and replace 67 beds from Dunrovin Park Lodge, for a total of 288 beds. The home will be located on land provided by the City of Quesnel. It will be built and operated by Providence Living in partnership with Northern Health under a project development agreement. Construction of the new facility is expected to begin in fall 2026 following the design phase and is expected to be ready for residents in late 2028. Mental health crisis team launches in Prince George

People experiencing a mental health or substance use crisis in Prince George will soon have access to a new community-led Peer Assisted Care Team (PACT) to help them stabilize and find the support they need.

"PACT provides immediate, compassionate help from those who have walked a similar path," said Jennifer Whiteside, Minister of Mental Health and Addictions. "In Prince George, people in crisis will benefit from the support of skilled professionals and a person with lived experience who understands what they are going through. Seniors in Smithers will have greater access to care closer to home with the approval of a new long-term care home, which will bring 160 new publicly funded beds to the community.

"The investment in the new long-term care homes in Smithers represents our government's ongoing commitment to improving access to high-quality, compassionate care for seniors in British Columbia," said Adrian Dix, Minister of Health. "This action represents a significant step forward in addressing the growing demand for long-term care and our government's ongoing efforts to strengthen health care in rural and remote communities." GetCheckedOnline launches in Dawson Creek

Northern Health is excited to have GetCheckedOnline launch in Dawson Creek. This is the first Northern Health community to be a part of GetCheckedOnline, which is celebrating its 10th anniversary in 2024.

What is GetCheckedOnline? It's a website service, provided by the BC Centre for Disease Control, that lets people test for sexually transmitted infections and HIV without having to visit a doctor or primary care provider. Work advances on expanding University Hospital of Northern BC

People in the North are one step closer to enhanced acute care and a dedicated cardiac unit with the approval of the business plan for a new patient-care tower at the University Hospital of Northern British Columbia (UHNBC).

"We know we have work ahead of us to make world-class acute care more accessible in the North and we'll keep working to get the job done," said Adrian Dix, Minister of Health. "Local leaders have identified the need to strengthen cardiac care and we're taking action to build up state-of-the art cardiac services close to home. As our population grows and ages, in Prince George and throughout the province, we're investing in health care to meet current and future demand." <u>Read more on our website</u>.

New CT scanner to improve diagnostic imaging at Kitimat General Hospital

Residents of Kitimat and area will benefit from better access to diagnostic imaging services with the funding committed and the planning beginning for a new CT scanner at Kitimat General Hospital. "With meaningful community partnerships, people in Kitimat will be able to get the scans they need faster and closer to home," said Adrian Dix, Minister of Health. "Adding a new CT scanner at the Kitimat General Hospital is part of the actions our government is taking to expand health services and ensure patients have access to necessary and life-saving care."

This project represents a \$4.7 million capital investment into improving healthcare in Kitimat. The Kitimat Hospital Foundation has contributed \$2.4 million through community donors including LNG Canda, the Max Lange Foundation, the First West Foundation, the District of Kitimat, and many members of the community. <u>Read more on our website</u>.

New supportive homes, complex-care spaces coming to Prince George

People experiencing or at risk of homelessness in Prince George will soon have more safe and secure housing options as approximately 100 supportive homes and complex-care housing (CCH) units are on the way.

"We know that when people experiencing homelessness have stable housing with supports, they can start to rebuild healthier lives," said Ravi Kahlon, Minister of Housing. "People with complex health issues overlapping with housing insecurity challenges are often caught up in a cycle of homelessness. The unit is located on Level 3 and also includes two high observation rooms, a secure courtyard for access to the outdoors, family visiting and consult rooms, a patient lounge, dining room, and kitchen, laundry room, exercise room, group therapy room, and activity room. Overdose prevention and response

Text alerts for toxic drugs available in the North

In response to the toxic drug emergency, a text message alert system was launched across Northern Health. The system sends text alerts with timely information and up-to-date resources to people who use drugs, those who support them, and community members. It's a public health measure to prevent drug poisonings and deaths and provides. Opt-in by texting **JOIN** to **ALERTS (253787)**. More information.

International Overdose Awareness Day 2024 - August 31

The BC Coroners Service confirms that toxic unregulated drugs claimed the lives of at least 2,511 British Columbians in 2023. In the eight years since April 2016, when a public health emergency was officially declared because of the soaring number of overdoses in BC, the lives of over 14,000 British Columbians have been tragically cut short.

Due to unregulated illicit substances, 14,000 families in British Columbia buried loved ones and struggled to pick up the pieces after losing a child, spouse, parent, or friend. The total number of lives lost in 2023 equates to an average of 6.9 deaths every single day. Overdose deaths have become the leading cause of death in British Columbia for people aged 10 to 59, accounting for more deaths than homicides, suicides, accidents, and natural diseases combined. <u>Read more on our website</u>.
