New hospital in Terrace open for patients

People in Terrace and surrounding areas now have access to the new state-of-the-art Ksyen Regional Hospital, which opened Sunday, Nov. 24, 2024.

"People in Terrace had been asking for an upgraded health-care facility for years, and our government recognized the need and took action to make sure it happened," said Josie Osborne, Minister of Health. "British Columbians deserve access to health care in modern, cutting-edge facilities and we are excited to be able to provide this to the community. We will continue to invest in capital health projects around the province."

The new hospital is more than twice the size of the previous facility and has 82 beds, private rooms, a bigger emergency department space, including two trauma bays, six stretcher bays, pediatric care space and four operating rooms, as well as the latest diagnostic imaging equipment.

New Terrace hospital gifted Tsimshian name

The new state-of-the-art hospital in Terrace has reached another important milestone as it has been gifted a Tsimshian name, Ksyen Regional Hospital, Terrace. The name recognizes the territory in which the hospital was built and the region it serves.

Local First Nations and municipal leaders had discussions together about the naming of the hospital. It was agreed that a Tsimshian name proposed by the Kitsumkalum First Nation would be the name submitted to be approved by the Northern Health Board of Directors and the Province. <u>Read more in our news release</u>.

Residents of Kitimat and area will benefit from better access to diagnostic imaging services with the funding committed and the planning beginning for a new CT scanner at Kitimat General Hospital.

"With meaningful community partnerships, people in Kitimat will be able to get the scans they need faster and closer to home," said Adrian Dix, then-Minister of Health. "Adding a new CT scanner at the Kitimat General Hospital is part of the actions our government is taking to expand health services and ensure patients have access to necessary and life-saving care." New Fort St. James health facility nears completion

People in Fort St. James will soon have enhanced access to high-quality health care as the new hospital and health centre nears substantial completion.

"With the substantial completion of the facility, people will be one step closer to an expanded emergency department, improved diagnostic imaging services and better access to primary care in their community," said Adrian Dix, then-Minister of Health. "This investment will also provide health-care professionals with the space and technology they need to provide more cutting edge care. Reaching this significant milestone will ensure people in the North have access to the care they need close to home, now and well into the future."

Patients will start receiving care in the new facility when it opens in January 2025. Demolition of the current hospital is anticipated to begin early in 2025, with full completion of the project expected in September 2025. Capital Projects

New energy upgrades enhance comfort and efficiency at Gateway Lodge

In a significant step towards sustainability and improved efficiency, Gateway Lodge in Prince George has recently undergone a series of energy upgrades and improvements. These enhancements include the installation of a new chiller, upgrades to kitchen ventilation systems, optimization of heat recovery, LED lighting upgrades, and improvements to building controls. Department Highlight – Inpatient Unit and Rooms

The inpatient unit in the new hospital will have 32 medical and surgical beds and 10 convalescent care beds. All inpatient rooms are private with ensuite washrooms, are located around the perimeter of the building, and have large windows for access to natural light. Each room includes a patient bed, bedside table, furniture for visitors, interactive patient education/entertainment station, wardrobe, and a ceiling lift extending from the bed into the washroom. Throughout the inpatient unit, there are also visitor and patient lounges and dining spaces, family consult rooms, and quiet rooms. Overdose prevention and response

More than 1,700 lives lost to drug toxicity in first nine months of 2024

Unregulated toxic drugs claimed the lives of 187 British Columbians in August and 183 in September, according to the BC Coroners Service.

The preliminary data finds that since January 2024, at least 1,749 people have died from unregulated drug toxicity in communities throughout the province.

The data for the first nine months of 2024 represents an 8% decrease from the number of deaths during the first nine months of 2023 (1,896). In both August and September, approximately six people died each day from suspected unregulated drugs.

Toxic drug alert: Prince George – November 27, 2024

Northern Health has issued a Drug Advisory for **Prince George**. A pressed, white, 8mg tablet sold as Dilaudid/Dilly tested positive for fentanyl. The pill looks very similar to a prescription Dilaudid or Hydromorphone.

Toxic drug alert: Prince Rupert – October 30, 2024

There has been an increase in overdoses in the community of Prince Rupert linked to drugs sold as "down". Overdoses occurring when drugs are smoked, individuals require multiple doses of naloxone to reverse.

Text alerts for toxic drugs available in the North

In response to the toxic drug emergency, a text message alert system was launched across Northern Health. The system sends text alerts with timely information and up-to-date resources to people who use drugs, those who support them, and community members.
