New Fort St. James hospital open for patients

People in Fort St. James and area have enhanced access to health care in state-of-the-art surroundings with the opening of the new hospital on Tuesday, January 14, 2025.

"We're thrilled to announce that the new hospital is opening to patients in Fort St. James, increasing access to health care close to home," said Josie Osborne, Minister of Health. "This facility represents a significant investment in the health and well-being of people in the region; a need that First Nations and local communities have been expressing for decades. We

recognized the urgency of replacing the facility and now both the community and workers will benefit from a modern health-care environment in this state-of-the-art facility.”

The new facility is three times the size of the previous hospital and has 27 beds, with 18 long-term care and nine acute-care beds. It has an expanded emergency department with two treatment rooms, a trauma bay and an ambulance bay. In addition, there are bigger laboratory and diagnostic-imaging spaces. Northern Health reboots CLICK for Babies™ with launch of Period of PURPLE Crying program

New parents and caregivers of newborns and 2-month-old infants in the Northern Health region are receiving a handmade purple knitted or crocheted cap, along with education and resources, as Northern Health reboots CLICK for Babies™ with the Period of PURPLE Crying program.

The goal of the purple cap campaign, called CLICK for Babies™, is to raise awareness about PURPLE crying and the importance of never shaking infants and young children. “PURPLE crying” is a normal phase of infant development when a baby cries inconsolably for long periods of time, starting around two weeks of age, peaking around two months, then decreasing - and it can be frustrating and overwhelming for parents and caregivers. The program provides evidence-based information about the normalcy of inconsolable crying, how to cope with negative feelings, and tips to soothe babies.

NH received more than 1,250 caps from PSBSBC to restart the CLICK campaign in NH for 2025. Stay tuned later this year, when NH will have more information on plans to expand the campaign to invite Northern BC knitters, crocheters and crafters to make both baby caps and booties! Children aged 11 and younger can now be signed up for HealthElife

Parents and caregivers of children aged 0-11 can now request access to their minor’s HealthElife portal account. This gives the parent or caregiver direct access to the child’s health record and some health services such as booking a lab appointment.

Dawson Creek & District Hospital replacement project

In early December, the Dawson Creek skyline returned to its original state as we said [farewell to the two tower cranes \(aka Hank and Dan\)](#). The tower cranes played a crucial role in the construction of the new hospital, and they captured the hearts and imaginations of our community. Their departure marks the end of an era but also reminds us of the power of progress as we look forward to the opening of the new Dawson Creek & District Hospital in Spring 2027.

Prior to the holidays, Graham Design-Builders and Northern Health representatives and users met on-site to review a [mock-up of the inpatient washroom and accessories](#). Collecting user input and feedback is an important step of the ongoing design process in order to ensure the design meets the highest standards of functionality and safety. The feedback gathered was centered around the placement of the nurse call and emergency buttons, paper towel dispensers, nightlight, grab bars, backrest, sink cleanout, and cut off valves.

Recently, the Northern Lights College (NLC) Executive and Health Sciences teams had a tour of the new hospital and were very excited to see the remarkable progress being made. We would like to recognize that NLC has been an excellent neighbour since construction started. They allowed Graham Design-Builders to lease portions of their land for site offices and parking lots and worked closely with us on road closure planning and notices. In return, we have provided them with excavated dirt and fill for future projects on their campus. In addition, the rear access road into the NLC campus will be straightened out, which will improve accessibility for everyone using the road.

Overdose prevention and response

Toxic drug alert: Dawson Creek

Northern Health has issued a Toxic Drug Alert for Dawson Creek. A bright pink pill being sold as fentanyl has been linked to sudden overdoses requiring naloxone and/or hospitalization. Overdoses occur when the substance is consumed orally, inhaled, or injected. Use caution when using substance through any route.

In response to the toxic drug emergency, a text message alert system was launched across Northern Health. The system sends text alerts with timely information and up-to-date resources to people who use drugs, those who support them, and community members.
