

There are many physiological changes that occur at end of life. The 'Top 5 Drugs – A Palliative Care Royal Flush' treat the most commonly seen symptoms at end-of-life:

Dvspnea

Anxiety

Worsening Pain

Delirium

- Terminal Respiratory Secretions
- Nausea

Atropine - End of life secretions ✓

- <u>Contraindications</u>: Narrow-angle glaucoma, obstructive uropathy, reflux esophagitis
- <u>Dose:</u> Terminal respiratory congestion –
 Atropine 1% ophthalmic solution, 2 drops q1h PRN sublingual or buccal <u>or</u>, Atropine 0.4-0.8 SC q4h & q1h PRN
- <u>Side effects:</u> Blurred vision, tachycardia, dry mouth, constipation, urinary retention, flushing, dysphagia

Dexamethasone – Pain ✓ Nausea/Vomiting ✓

- <u>Contraindications:</u> Systemic fungal infections, concurrent use of NSAID's
- <u>Dose:</u> Anti-emetic 4-8 mg PO/SC daily,
 Pain Adjuvant 4-8 mg PO/SC daily
- <u>Side effects:</u> Hyperglycemia, insomnia, euphoria, GI irritation, increased appetite, fluid retention, delayed wound healing

Haloperidol - Agitation/Delirium ✓ Nausea/Vomiting ✓

- <u>Contraindications:</u> Parkinson's, severe cardiovascular disease, severe CNS depression
- <u>Dose</u>: Parenteral dose is 50% of oral dose
 Anti-emetic 0.5-2.5 mg PO/SC QID,
 Delirium (mild) 0.5-1.5 mg PO t.i.d.
 (moderate) 1.5-5 mg PO/SC q30
 (severe) 5-10 mg SC q30 mins until relief
- <u>Side effects:</u> Extrapyramidal effects, sedation, hypotension

Methotrimeprazine - Terminal agitation ✓ delirium ✓ Intractable pain ✓ Nausea/Vomiting ✓

- <u>Contraindications:</u> CNS depression, severe hepatic or cardiac disease, hematologic disorders
- <u>Dose:</u> Parenteral dose is 50% of oral dose
 <u>Terminal agitation / delirium (mild)</u>10-15 mg
 <u>PO/SC q4-6h</u>

(severe) 10-50 PO/SC q30 min until relief, then 10-50 mg PO/SC q4-8h

Anti-emetic - 6.25-25 mg PO/SC q4-24h,

 <u>Side effects</u>: Sedation, postural hypotension, tachycardia, dry mouth, constipation

Hydromorphone – Moderate – Severe pain ✓ Breathlessness ✓

- Contraindications: hypersensitivity to the medication
- <u>Dose:</u> Parenteral dose is 50% of oral dose
 Analgesia/Breathlessness Starting dose for opioid-naïve 0.5 -1 mg PO q4h with breakthrough ordered at 0.25-0.5 mg PO q1h PRN
- <u>Side effects:</u> Nausea/vomiting, drowsiness, constipation, dry mouth
